**Mission:** To strengthen the national capacity to implement cost-effective, large-scale research studies that engage health care delivery organizations as research partners.

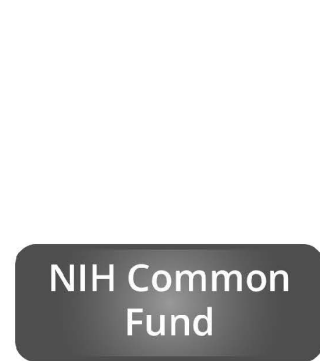

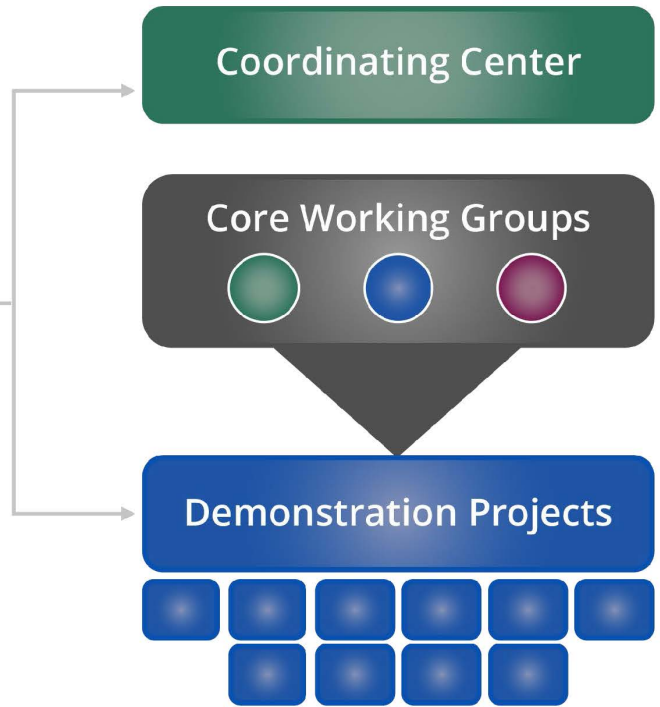


# NIH HCS Structure: 2012-2017

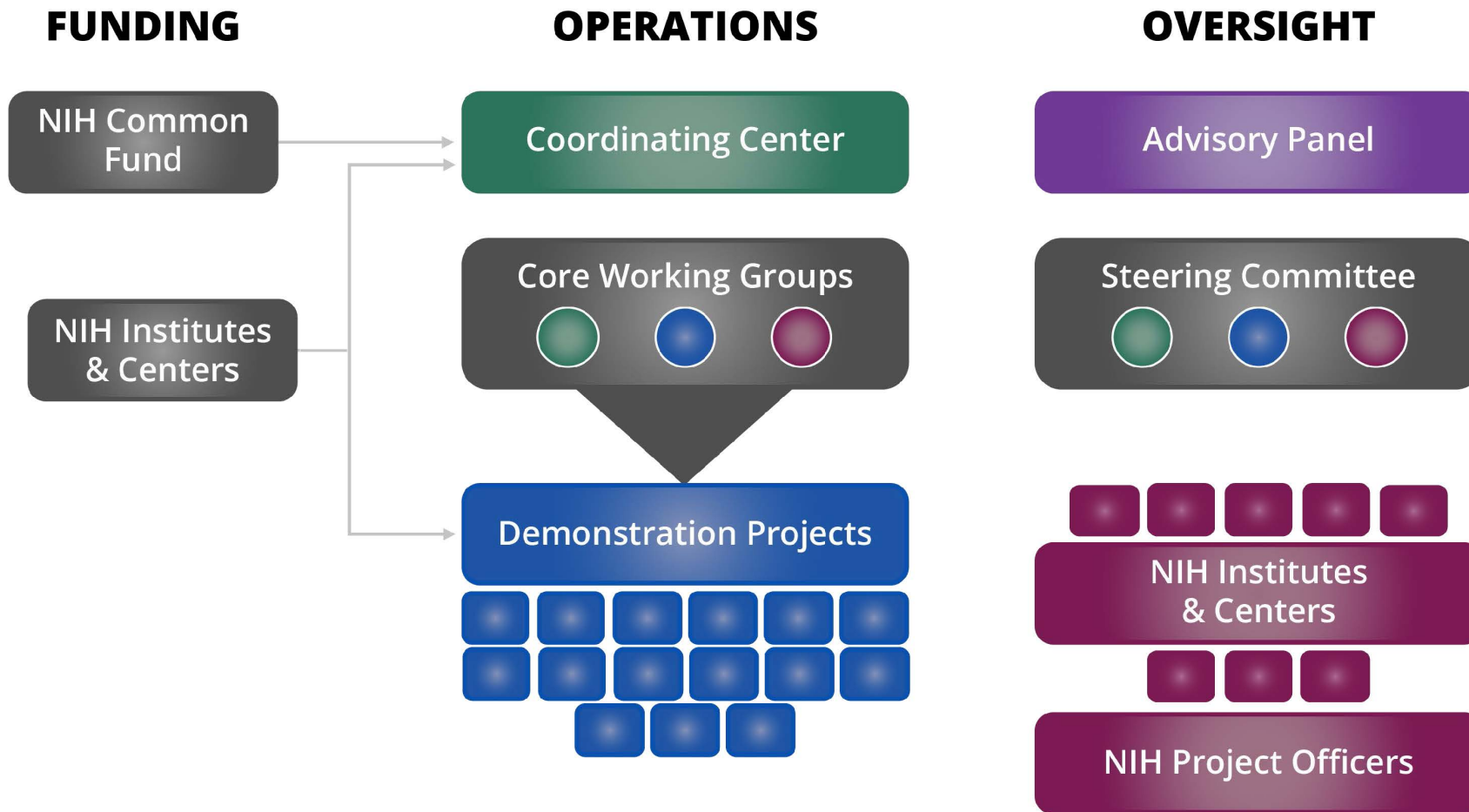

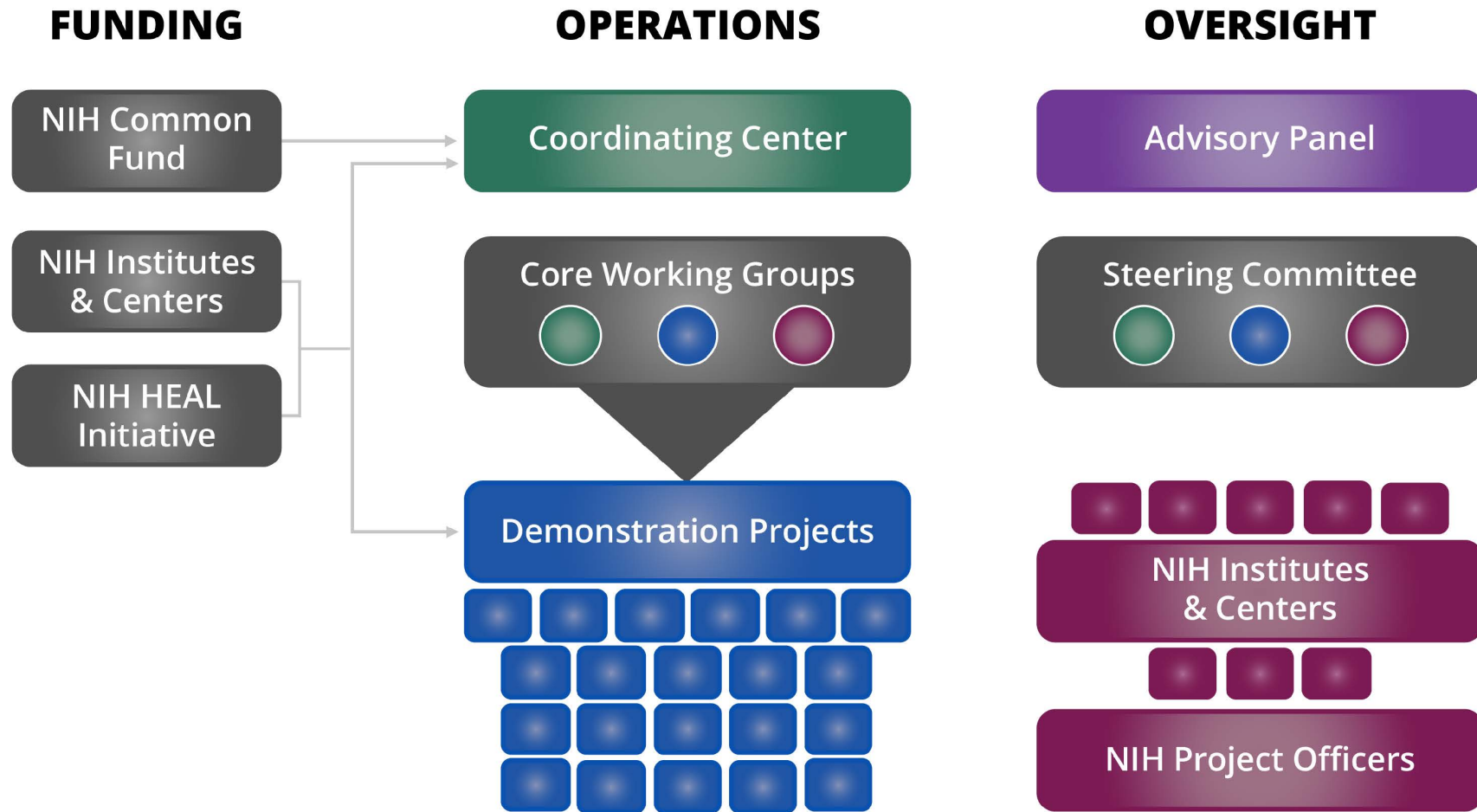

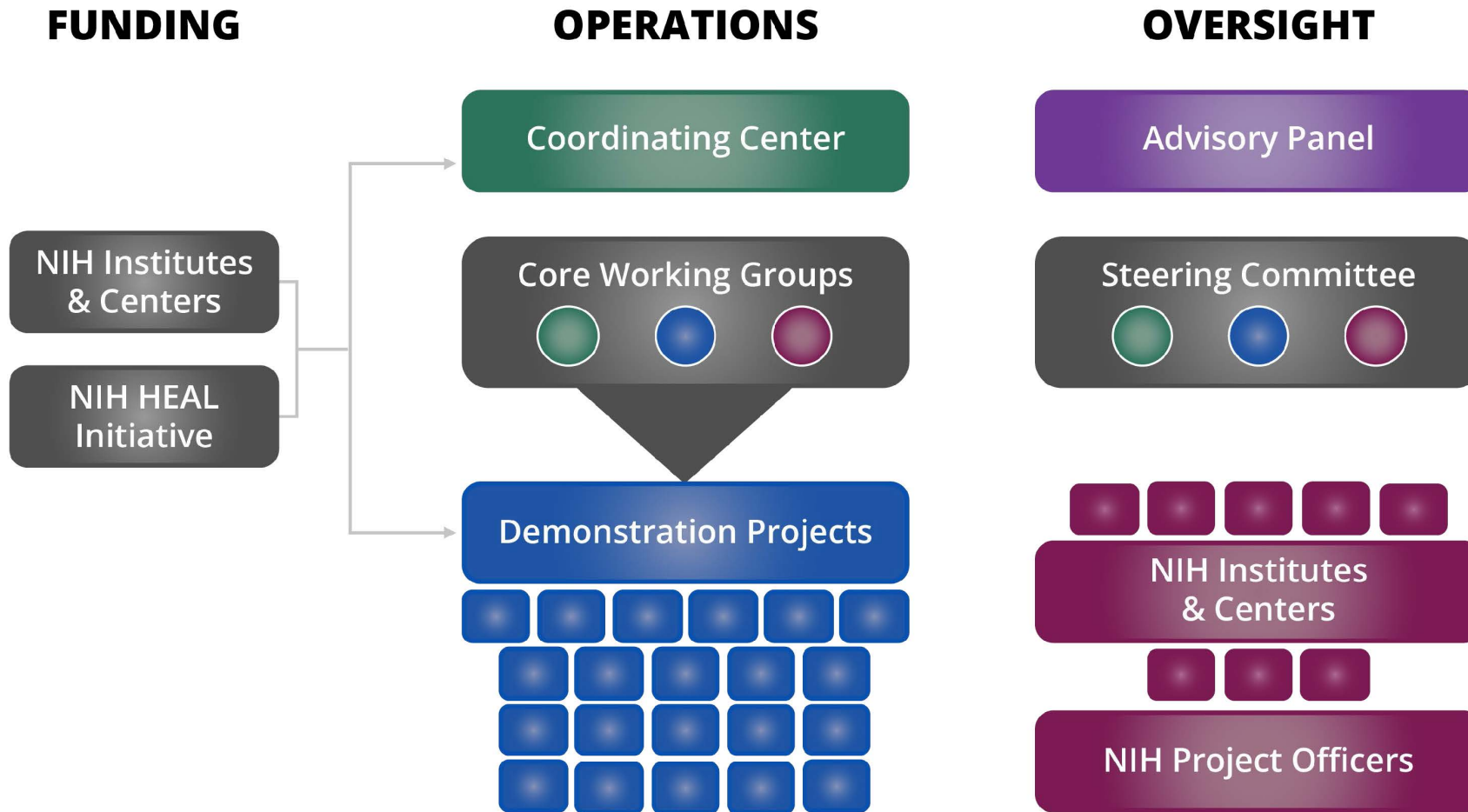
# NIH HCS Structure: 2017-2019



# NIH HCS Structure: 2019-2021

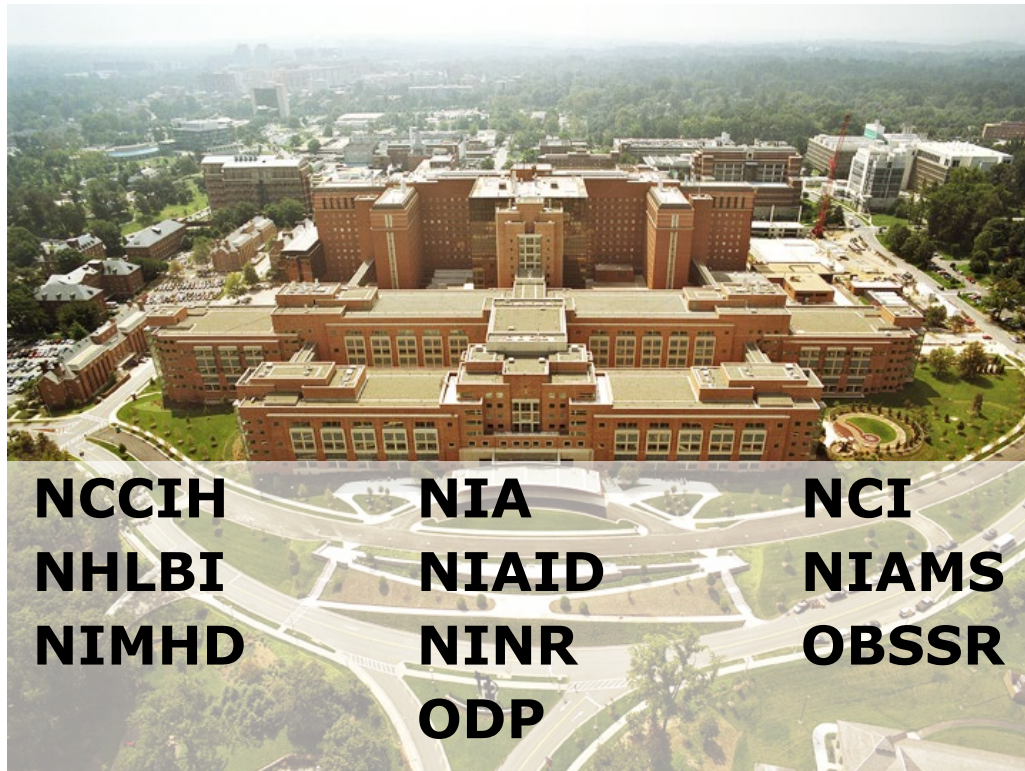


# NIH PTC Structure: 2022 onward

# NIH PRAGMATIC TRIALS COLLABORATORY

Rethinking Clinical Trials®

- Initial funding from Common Fund gave support for new ways to think about clinical research and allowed these ideas to take hold by demonstrating academic rigor
- Successful transition from Common Fund to IC support demonstrated appreciation of the Collaboratory's value and uptake among a broad group of NIH ICs
- Integration with NIH HEAL initiative PRISM program extended the Collaboratory's reach into a major NIH wide program to address the opioid crisis
- Informed other NIH initiatives (PMC, IMPACT) utilizing pragmatic trials to address major challenging health areas
  - Pain management in Military and Veterans health care systems (PMC)
  - People living with dementia and their care partners (IMPACT)
